THE VERB

Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy: "Jesus Christ is the face of the Father's mercy." With these opening words of his letter entitled "Misericordiae Vultus", Pope Francis proclaimed an Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy from 8 December 2015 and extending through 20 November 2016, the Solemnity of Christ the King. This year provides myriad opportunities for the faithful to experience Jesus as the face of the Father's mercy. One particular gift flowing from the Jubilee Year of Mercy is a special grant of an indulgence issued from the Holy Father himself. Our Cathedral has been designated to assist pilgrims in obtaining the spiritual benefits attached to this indulgence. Didn't We Get Rid of Indulgences? No, not at all-but the Church has tried to explain its theology more fully than in the past. An Indulgence is a remission (a "taking away") of the temporal punishment due to sin that the faithful may obtain under specific conditions. It is not a prayer for work that removes guilt itself (as was once erroneously taught), but some or all of the temporal punishment due to sin, after the guilt has been expiated. The connection with the Church is critical, as the treasury of the merits of Christ and the saints is freely opened to those who desire forgiveness (cf. Matt. 28:18). Each time you confess your sins to a priest, before granting absolution, you receive a penance, a prayer or work that helps to "make up" for the effects of sin. "Such penance help configure us to Christ, who alone expiated our sins once for all." (Catechism of CC#1460). The theology of indulgences is very rich, but also somewhat confusing to many Catholics. It is divinely reveled truth that sins carry with them punishments that , due to God's justice, must be expiated. Saint Augustine wrote: "Every sin, whether small or great, must be punished, either by man himself doing penance, or by God chastising him." (Exposition on Psalm 58,1,13) There is truly no such thing as a completely "private" sin. Our sins affect others around us. Purgatory-Our Final Purification Enter Purgatory, the name given to the final purification of those who, counted among the saved, undergo purification after death, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of God. Purgatory is a state of cleansing (from Lat. Purgare, to make clean) from the temporal punishment due for sins whose guilt has been forgiven, but in which satisfaction for the effects of those sins is still being offered. Think of the sins as being like nails removed from a wooden 2x4. The nail holes remain (the effects from sin), whose guilt has already been removed. Following our earthly lives, there exists a period of purgation by which the effects from our sins are expiated (to "smooth out" the holes) allowing a should to be in a state most pleasing to God sine macula et ruga," without stain or wrinkle." If you can picture a crisply laundered and ironed white oxford shirt! Absent of this last requirement, indulgences are partial, that is, they remit some of the temporal punishment due to sin, but not all. The emphasis in the Church is wisely more focused on faithfully fulfilling one's spiritual duties than on "how much" temporal punishment is removed. Current norms do not specify the remission beyond designating it as either partial or plenary. "Not as man sees does God see, because mind sees the appearance but the Lord looks into the heart." (1Samuel 16:7) The words of Tertullian (ca. 200 A.D.) are appropriate here: "The body cannot rejoice when one of its members suffers, but the whole body must suffer with it and help to cure it. The Church is in both one and the other; the Church however, is Christ." (On Penance, 10, 5-6) The Church's aim is both to assist the faithful in expiating the punishment due to sin and in urging them to perform the works of piety, penitence and charity. The Jubilee Indulgence is a great spiritual gift offered to us from our Holy Father. Don't waste the opportunity!

ELECTION AS OPPORTUNITY

The election cycle grinds on and we are bombarded with political ads which accuse, promise, mislead, and promote. If we listen to those ads will we discern the truth? Or are we tempted to turn our backs on the political arena which seems to either ignore or distort Christian morals? If we listen to Jesus we will hear the truth. His voice is found in the Gospels-His life teaches us how to live the commandments. Will we spend more time listening to the ads or to Jesus? If we devote more time to Jesus we will be able to evaluate the political ads and hear what Jesus wants us to do with this opportunity. His influence will help us determine which candidates on a national, state, and local level better represent Catholic values in their policies, actions, and appointments. Many issues compete for our attention. How do we prioritize them? Hospital emergency rooms triage patients- all will be seen, but those with the most severe wounds or illness will be treated first. In a similar way, the 1998 pastoral letter from the U.S. Bishops, Living the Gospel of Life, provides helpful guidance as we prayerfully discern our actions. The pastoral letter clearly states, "Opposition to abortion and euthanasia does not excuse indifference to those who suffer from poverty, violence and injustice... Any politics of human dignity must seriously address issues of racism, poverty, hunger, employment, education, housing, and health care... But being 'right' in such matters can never excuse a wrong choice regarding direct attacks on innocent human life. All direct attacks on innocent human life, such as abortion and euthanasia... directly and immediately violate the human person's most fundamental right-the right to life." USCCB.org/issues-and-action/ faithful-citizenship assists schools, parishes, youth, and young adult groups to learn more about Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship. Finally, prayer is crucial. Pray that at every level of government, we will elect leaders who uphold God's laws about life and love, who believe in religious liberty, and who are not afraid to say, In God We Trust.

RESPECT EVERY LIFE

We are a conflicted country. If a teen shows signs of despondency, his family and friends are encouraged to intervene and even call the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline (1-800-273-talk). We want that teen to realize how precious their life is. On the other hand, if someone suffers form depression or chronic illness, is elderly or frail, or lives with a physical disability, that person may be encouraged to take advantage of a socially ,and sometimes legally, sanctioned method to end their life- physician assisted suicide. This disparity sends a clear messaged that some lives are worth living and some lives are not. Physician assisted suicide is already legal in five states, (Oregon, Washington, Montana, Vermont, and California). There are 19 more states considering Death with Dignity legislation. With the specter of medial rationing due to cost and availability, the idea of getting rid of people who are viewed as too expensive or not worthy is very tempting to a secular society. As Catholics we value every life and embrace natural death as honoring God's authority over life. Pray and support our Pro-Life mission during this month.
